The "Hunker" Corner Stone.

The following resolution was passed by a convention,
held at Wheatland, and elected EDWIN CROSWELL, editor of the Albany
Tribune, a delegate to the Baltimore Convention:

Resolved, That holding to the principle of non-inter-
ference with the rights of others in their fullest and
most just sense, we are opposed to restrictions of any and
every kind, on the action of the people of any part of this
country, as to the disposition they may choose to
make of their PROPERTY in settling territory which may
be acquired from Mexico, either by valor and blood of
our citizens, from every part of our common coun-
try by treaty; for we contend that Congress has no
right to interpose obstacles to the settlement of
territory by any portion of our people, with whatever
PROPERTY (meaning their negro slaves,) they
may see fit to carry the same, nor to interfere with the insti-
tutions of such territory.

Carry out the principles of the above, and you doom
us, Nebraska and Minnesota, as well as California
and New Mexico, to human Slavery. A B

Woman's Rights Convention--Gather- ing of Females.

This Convention pursuant to a previous call, com-
menced its session at the Unitarian Church in this
city yesterday. There was a large attendance,
and the proceedings were characterized by a zeal,
spirit, talent and enthusiasm rarely excelled in con-
ventions of any character held amongst us.

A preliminary meeting was held at Protection
Hall on Tuesday evening, ABIGAIL BUSH presiding,
and SARAH A. BURTIS acting as Secretary, for the
purpose of appointing committees and arranging
business preparatory to the assembling of the Con-
vention. At the preliminary meeting, a synopsis
of the Declaration of Rights adopted at the con-
vention held in Seneca Falls, was read from the
Rochester Daily Advertiser and referred to the
convention, in absence of the entire declaration.—
Resolutions were then offered by AMY POST, and
referred to the convention without discussion. The
chair appointed SARAH D. FISH, AMY POST and
RHODA DEGARMO a committee to report suitable
persons to act as officers of the convention, and
MISS TONE and Mrs. ROBERTS were appointed a
committee to investigate the wrongs of the laboring
classes, and to invite the oppressed portion of the
community to attend the meeting of the conven-
tion and take a part in its deliberations. In the
course of the evening LUCRETIA MOTT, Mrs. ROB-
ERTS and others made some appropriate remarks,
the latter lady mostly in relation to the intolerable
servitude and small remuneration paid to the work-
ing class of females and operatives.
