

## GOOD REPORTS OF YEAR'S WORK

READ AT MEETING OF POLITICAL  
EQUALITY CLUB.

### \$20 VOTED FOR ANTHONY MEMORIAL

Annual Convention of Ontario County Organization Held at Geneva Yesterday—Rev. Anna Shaw Was Present—Election of Officers Held

Geneva, June 3.—This morning at the First Universalist Church, beginning at 10 o'clock, the fourth annual convention of the Ontario County Political Equality Club was held. The session was opened by the president, Mrs. Charlotte A. Baldrige. About thirty delegates from the five societies and many other members and visitors, were present.

The church was attractively decorated for the occasion. The large yellow banner of the club was draped over the president's chair; the framed portrait of Miss Susan B. Anthony occupied a conspicuous place, and palms, white carnations and California yellow poppies were also in evidence. The session was opened with a few remarks by the president, after which the committee on resolutions and credentials was appointed.

The yearly report of the secretary was read by Mrs. R. H. Robinson, of this city, and the treasurer's report by Miss Mary Coolidge, of Clifton Springs. The report showed a balance of over \$65 still in the treasury, and of this \$20 was voted to be donated toward the Susan B. Anthony memorial at Rochester.

As the state president, Mrs. E. H. Crosssett, who was to have spoken on the subject of the Anthony memorial, was absent, Rev. Anna Howard Shaw, national president, gave a brief account of the circumstances under which the University of Rochester was opened to women students. Mrs. George Schell gave a report of the School Suffrage Committee work and Miss Anne F. Miller a report of the splendid work accomplished by the Committee on Peace. She stated that 557 names had been secured and had been sent to The Hague in the peace petition. Miss Miller also read a letter from Mrs. M. E. Craigie as a report of the legislative work done by the county societies and the state association.

The secretaries of the five societies in Ontario county, Allen's Hill, Honeoye, Clifton Springs, Phelps and Geneva, read excellent reports of the past year's work, showing that the political equality movement is gaining a strong foothold and progressing.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. Charlotte A. Baldrige, Geneva; vice-president, Miss Ashley, Honeoye; secretary, R. H. Robinson, Geneva; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Holbrook, Phelps; treasurer, Dr. F. A. Green, Geneva; auditors, H. A. Wheat, Geneva; Miss Mary Coolidge, Clifton Springs; Mrs. Horace Peck, Allen's Hill.

The delegates to the state convention, which will be held in this city in October, are: Mrs. Van Aiken, Phelps; Miss Fox, Clifton Springs; Mrs. Franklin, Honeoye; alternates, Miss Buss, Clifton Springs; Mrs. Bussy, Phelps, and Mrs. A. B. Sayre, Honeoye.

The meeting adjourned at 12:15 and the visiting delegates dined at the Kirkwood hotel. This afternoon the annual piazza party was held at the residence of Mrs. Elizabeth Smith Miller, an elaborate musical programme was carried out and the principal address was given by Rev. Anna Howard Shaw, president of the National Woman's Suffrage Association.
