HEALTH DEPARTMENT
TOWNS WITH UNPRO-
TECTED WATER SUPPLIES ARE
DANGERED WITH TYPHOID
FEVER.

—More than 3,000,000 resi-
dents of New York state are drinking
water of impure and questionable
quality according to an estimate of the
health department made public.
With unprotected water sup-
ply apt to have typhoid fever car-
ried, the department predicts.
According to the best statistics, the
department estimates that 8
residents of the state get a
supply of water, 900,000 from
dangerous sources, and 2,000,
from private sources, the purity
of which is a matter of conjecture.
Pure waters may be made safe
by simple and inexpensive
methods of filtration or disinfection,
the department says.
